A STATEMENT FROM CEO OF RECONCILIATION AUSTRALIA

Reconciliation Australia welcomes Arkhefield to the Reconciliation Action Plan (RAP) program with the formal endorsement of its inaugural Reflect RAP.

Arkhefield joins a network of more than 3,000 corporate, government, and not-for-profit organisations that have made a formal commitment to reconciliation through the RAP program.

Since 2006, RAPs have provided a framework for organisations to leverage their structures and diverse spheres of influence to support the national reconciliation movement. The program's potential for impact is greater than ever, with over 5.5 million people now working or studying in an organisation with a RAP.

The four RAP types — Reflect, Innovate, Stretch and Elevate — allow RAP partners to continuously develop and strengthen reconciliation commitments in new ways. This Reflect RAP will lay the foundations, priming the workplace for future RAPs and reconciliation initiatives.

The RAP program's strength is its framework of relationships, respect, and opportunities, allowing an organisation to strategically set its reconciliation commitments in line with its own business objectives, for the most effective outcomes.

These outcomes contribute towards the five dimensions of reconciliation: race relations; equality and equity; institutional integrity; unity; and historical acceptance.

It is critical to not only uphold all five dimensions of reconciliation, but also increase awareness of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander cultures, histories, knowledge, and leadership across all sectors of Australian society.

This Reflect RAP enables Arkhefield to deepen its understanding of its sphere of influence and the unique contribution it can make to lead progress across the five dimensions. Getting these first steps right will ensure the sustainability of future RAPs and reconciliation initiatives, and provide meaningful impact toward Australia's reconciliation journey.

OUR RAP

Arkhefield is implementing a Reflect Reconciliation Action Plan (RAP) to formalise our commitment to reconciliation, strengthen our relationship with First Nations peoples and pro-actively improve the way we operate.

As architects and designers, we recognise the responsibility we hold in shaping the environments where people live, work, and gather. Our work offers a unique opportunity to honour Country, elevate cultural narratives, and foster unity between Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples and non-Indigenous Australians. Through our RAP, we seek to mature as a practice by deepening our understanding of First Nations cultures, histories, and knowledge systems. We are committed to respectful engagement, with the aim of developing partnerships and a design process that respects Indigenous Cultural and Intellectual Property (ICIP) rights. Our RAP also provides a framework to create meaningful pathways for employment and engagement with Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander suppliers, organisations, and consultants. This initiative reflects our core values of integrity, quality, and creativity, and supports our goal to enrich lives and enact change.

A RAP Working Group has been established to guide the implementation of our Reconciliation Action Plan. This group with support of the broader team is responsible for progressing our commitments and ensuring that actions are carried out in a meaningful and inclusive way. Currently we do not have Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander representation on our team. This will be addressed as an important early step in the implementation process.

Peter Rudledge, Arkhefield Associate Director, is taking on the role of RAP Champion. In this capacity, he supports the visibility and impact of our reconciliation efforts, helping to embed the principles of the RAP both within the organisation and in our external relationships.

OUR RECONCILIATION ACTIVITIES

Arkhefield actively engages in reconciliation and cultural awareness through a range of formal and informal initiatives. Over the past three years, the team has participated in both NAIDOC Week and National Reconciliation Week by discussing the annual themes, their significance, and promoting local events. Staff have completed the SBS Diversity and Inclusion program, including a dedicated First Nations course to deepen understanding of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander cultures in the workplace.

Additionally, Arkhefield participated in a cultural landscape walking tour of South Brisbane (Kurilpa) and the Brisbane CBD (Meanjin), led by Professor Paul Memmott and Aboriginal scholar Alex Bond. Throughout the tour, Alex shared insights into the traditional Aboriginal significance of various sites, recounted key historical events from the colonial period, and explained the ongoing cultural relevance of the landscape today. Following the tour, we conducted an internal survey to reflect on what we had learned, what we were curious to explore further, and how this knowledge might inform our design practice. The experience deepened our collective understanding and appreciation of Aboriginal culture and heritage, particularly in relation to place and landscape. It also highlighted the importance of continued learning and the need to engage more meaningfully with Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander organisations on all of our projects.

In developing Arkhefield's Acknowledgement of Country, the practice collaborated with Blaklash and Troy Casey to ensure it authentically reflected First Nations perspectives and had specific meaning to our organisation. This collaboration grew through ongoing, reflective conversations with Troy, who encouraged us to consider our practice values and explore how these could genuinely align with our Acknowledgement of Country.

As part of the Salvation Army social housing project, Arkhefield engaged with Gimuy Walubara Yidinji Elder and ceremonial leader, Uncle Peter Bumi Hyde, who was engaged to meet with the project team and provide critical input into the cultural safety and design of the project. In the context of this project cultural safety ensured the spaces and places felt welcoming, respectful, safe and appropriate for First Nations peoples.
